MAJOR AREAS OF WORK:

Project Oversight: Responsible for the general oversight of the grant funded project: Statewide Delivery of Lone Star Healthy Streams Feral Hog Component and Providing Technical Assistance on Feral Hog Management in Priority Watersheds. Primary tasks include coordination of statewide project activities, directing project personnel, resource creation and submission quarterly reports of project activities.

Outreach Planning: Collaborate with project team members to plan educational outreach techniques for both in-person and online outreach efforts. Assist County Extension Agents (CEA) in planning feral hog related programs based on the needs of the residents within their specific county of responsibility. Coordinate with local, state, federal and private entities, and individuals to arrange

workshop topics, speakers and other logistical aspects relevant to program implementation.

Educational Outreach: Conduct traditional face-to-face educational programming and compose extension publications, while also incorporating the use of web-based tools to disseminate research-based educational and technical content to a growing population of internet-based learners. Web-based tools include blogs, social media, infographics, videos and iPhone applications.

Implementation of Educational Programs: Provide assistance to CEAs and the public regarding feral hogs using, telephone, e-mail, office conferences, correspondence, field days, workshops, webinars and site visits.

Land Manager Technical Guidance: Provide on-site technical guidance on feral hog damage abatement strategies for land managers. Primarily generating a property specific feral hog damage abatement plan, that meets the needs and financial constraints of the land manager.

Results Demonstration Activities: Facilitate the demonstration of research-based feral hog management techniques. Activities include field trials, data collection and disseminating results through multiple outlets such as written publications and educational videos.

Coordination and Cooperation: Collaborate with a network of wildlife biologists, natural resource managers, watershed coordinators and scientists to aid in educational efforts including the expansion of existing feral hog educational programs and technical documents.

Faculty and Staff Training/Assistance: Provide training and educational opportunities for County Extension Agents and other Natural Resource Professionals concerning feral hog related subject areas.

Financial and Program Support of Extension Activities: Collaborate with extension personnel to apply for outside funding and participate in the submission of grant proposals.
